### New Eye Stroke Protocol at Mount Sinai Enables Rapid Diagnosis and Treatment to Prevent Permanent Vision Loss

Sudden vision loss in one eye may be a sign of Central Retinal Artery Occlusion (CRAO), commonly referred to as eye stroke. Like a stroke in the brain, it is a medical emergency and must be diagnosed and treated as quickly as possible to prevent irreversible loss of vision.



### What Happens During Eye Stroke

During an eye stroke, the artery supplying blood to the retina is blocked by a clot, depriving it of oxygen and causing the retinal nerve cells to die unless blood flow is quickly restored.



### Symptoms of Eye Stroke

- 1. Sudden painless vision loss or severe blurring in one eye.
- 2. Blurring may worsen over a few minutes and sometimes improve suddenly.
- 3. Painless vision loss is a risk factor for a brainstroke.



#### **Act Quickly! Every Minute Counts**

Sudden vision loss in one eye or severe blurring is a medical emergency, even if symptoms seem to improve. Treatment must be administered **within 6 - 12 hours,** to prevent irreversible vision loss.



#### Eye Stroke Treatment

A clot-busting drug, tPA, is injected directly into the blocked artery. This dissolves the clot and restores blood flow to the retina.



#### Where to Go for Treatment

The Emergency Departments at several Mount Sinai hospitals are equipped to diagnose (or rule out) and treat eye stroke quickly.
